A snapshot of MelNet's year | Celebrating our achievements

- In September we released the third edition of the <u>Quality Statements to Guide Melanoma Diagnosis and Treatment in New Zealand</u>. We are grateful to members of the Melanoma Working Group who devoted their time to ensuring the document continues to reflect latest research and best practice, and thank those in the sector for their considered feedback and ongoing support.
- A big focus this year has been on delivering education, and through our online and in-person events we have helped to build the knowledge and skills of nearly 500 health professionals. We expanded the scope of our educational activities to include non-melanoma skin cancer.
- A meeting of the Melanoma Research and Therapy Special Interest Group was held in September in conjunction with the New Zealand Society of Oncology (NZSO) conference. Due to the generosity of NZSO, we were fortunate to have Associate Professor Alex van Akkooi, an internationally regarded surgical oncologist at the Melanoma Institute of Australia present on adjuvant and neo-adjuvant therapy and contemporary melanoma surgery. Niamh Walsh also presented her New Zealand research on real-world outcomes of immunotherapy for melanoma brain metastases.
- Our advocacy efforts focused on two key areas: improving funding and resources for pathology services and greater Government investment in skin cancer prevention and early detection. We also made submissions to Pharmac for funding of BRAF and MEK inhibitors for advanced melanoma patients, and to ACC to include melanoma and non-melanoma skin cancer in the list of occupational diseases under the Accident Compensation Act 2001.

Looking forward to 2024

MelNet is still without a reliable income source, and our future remains at risk. Next year we will focus more of our resources on securing funding that can help sustain our organisation now and grow it into the future.

Save this date: Multi-disciplinary melanoma meeting

We understand there is considerable interest in a New Zealand Melanoma Summit. While we had hoped to be able to deliver the next Summit in 2024, our financial position means we are unable to resource and underwrite an event of this size. We acknowledge the importance of bringing together the New Zealand melanoma community so we are working to deliver a multi-disciplinary melanoma meeting on a smaller scale on the weekend of **10 - 12 May** next year.

More details and the remainder of our 2024 work plan will be released early next year.

Overdiagnosis of melanoma? | Interesting read

The reasons for an "epidemic" of melanoma overdiagnosis are complex and multifactorial, and the difference to the patient between a rapidly growing, aggressive nodular melanoma and a slow-growing, even indolent melanoma in situ is very large.

Professor David Wilkinson at HealthCert has compiled a collection of research papers from global dermoscopy experts that explore the topic of "Is a melanoma really a melanoma, and does it really matter?".
