Draft NZ Skin Cancer Primary Prevention and Early Detection Strategy | Consultation in progress

MelNet is seeking feedback on the draft 'New Zealand Skin Cancer Primary Prevention and Early Detection Strategy' from those with an interest in skin cancer prevention and early detection.

The draft strategy has been developed by a working group of skin cancer experts, with support from MelNet and Te Whatu Ora - Health New Zealand.

The document outlines a set of recommendations to guide New Zealand's skin cancer primary prevention and early detection efforts. These recommendations are supported by research on the epidemiology of skin cancer in New Zealand and the effectiveness of prevention and early detection interventions globally.

The draft 2024 – 2027 New Zealand Skin Cancer Primary Prevention and Early Detection Strategy comprises three documents:

- 1. The New Zealand Skin Cancer Primary Prevention and Early Detection Strategy
- 2. Supplementary information to the Strategy
- 3. Skin cancer prevention and early detection key messages

Government's cancer drugs promise | \$604 million in extra Pharmac funding

The Government has confirmed \$604 million over four years in extra Pharmac funding. This will include cover for 26 cancer treatments.

National had previously committed to 13 new cancer drugs, three of which were for melanoma. Six of these drugs were not included in the June announcement - including, according to reports, treatments for melanoma. Minister of Health, Dr Shane Reti has provided assurances that all 13 cancer drugs promised at the election, or suitable alternatives would be made available - some from October/November this year, and others being phased in over the next year.

Improving access to life-saving medicines is a key priority for MelNet. During our recent meeting with Minister Reti, MelNet representatives emphasised the importance of access to these drugs for melanoma patients and encouraged placing fewer restrictions on current treatments to further enhance survival outcomes. While details remain unclear, MelNet will continue to advocate strongly for these changes, along with the necessary resources and infrastructure to ensure their effective delivery within the healthcare system.

Lions Clubs New Zealand free mobile skin cancer screening service

Lions Clubs New Zealand are establishing a mobile skin cancer screening service that will operate nationwide from March 2025. Targeting those who cannot afford to have their skin checked privately, the service will provide a free full body skin check as well as prevention and early detection education.

In preparation for the launch of the first mobile vehicle, Lions are seeking trained professionals throughout New Zealand who can volunteer a couple of days a month, each year to the service.
